Oxygen Flow Meter Eases Patient Needs

(NU) - For the 32 million Americans currently suffering from Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (COPD), respiratory health and rising Medicare costs are a serious concern. A major cause of hospitalizations, COPD is the fifth leading cause of death in the United States.

Due to COPD's effect on the respiratory system and the tax payer, the majority of COPD patients receive some type of oxygen therapy, but medical professionals and patients alike have found the process to be challenging at times.

Oxyview, a breakthrough technology in the oxygen therapy market, may simplify the oxygen therapy process and save Medicare expenses associated with unnecessary service calls. It "provides a high measure of security to patients, who can quickly be alerted to malfunctioning equipment and take the necessary steps to correct the situation or immediately contact their oxygen provider," he says.
